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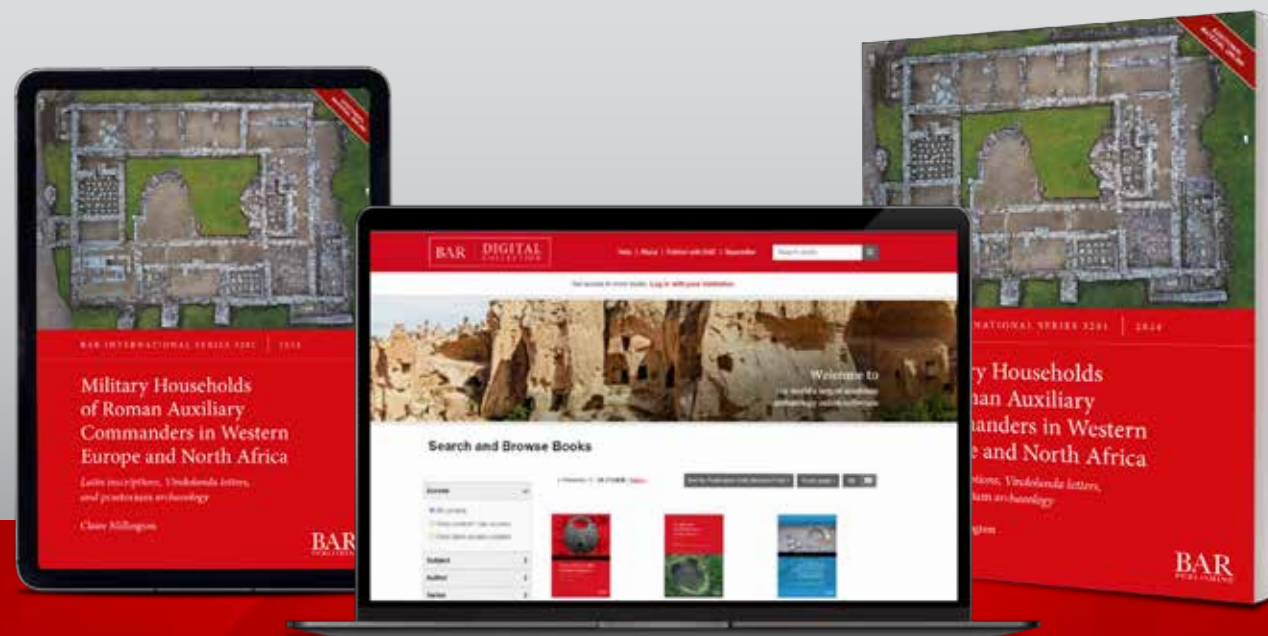

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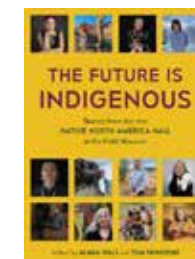


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Welcome to the 31st EAA Annual Meeting

We are honoured to welcome you to the 31st Annual Meeting of the European Association of Archaeologists!

Despite it being an online event this year, the local organising team drew inspiration from Belgrade over the years that the Annual Meeting was in preparation. Belgrade is the capital of Serbia, located at the confluence of the Sava and Danube rivers, with Mediaeval fortification - Kalemegdan as its principal landmark. It has a long history, dating from the first Neolithic settlements to the Middle Ages. The city was known as Singidunum in Roman times and is mentioned in written sources since 878 AD under the Slavic name Beograd (“White City”). In the course of time, it was constantly rebuilt and remodelled. Since it was located at the cross-roads between the Austro-Hungarian and Ottoman empires, always between the West and the East, it was destroyed and rebuilt almost 40 times. Some would say that Belgrade’s ability to quickly rebuild, change and evolve is the most important characteristic of the city.

Over the centuries of transformation, Belgrade has developed its own character, marked by a nuanced mix of tradition and modernity, with both the Latin and Cyrillic scripts in official use in Serbia. The turbulent events of the 1990s took their toll, but the capital has continued to grow and develop ever since. The unusually large number of bars, museums, galleries, and venues, located anywhere between Kalemegdan, old Ottoman residences or buildings inspired by mid-century brutalism, offer a variety of events for all tastes. Whether you prefer the charm of Eastern cuisine, exclusive and refined international dishes, quiet nights by the river, urban art, local artists, green markets, historical sights or nightly happenings, Belgrade will not disappoint.

In the words of Ivo Andrić, Nobel literature prize holder from 1961, who knew how to depict the history of the Balkan countries „This grand city (Belgrade) seems to have always been like this: torn and split, as if it never exists but is perpetually being created, built upon and recovered. On one side it waxes and grows on the other it wanes and deteriorates. Ever in motion and rustle, never calm and never knowing tranquillity or quiet. The city upon two rivers, on the grand clearing, bound by the winds.”

Even if you don’t get the chance to visit Belgrade this year, definitely put it on your travel list in the near future!

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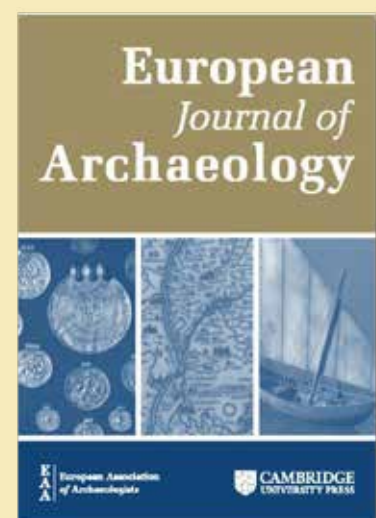
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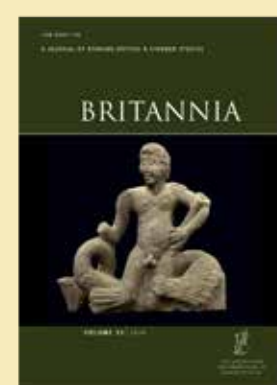
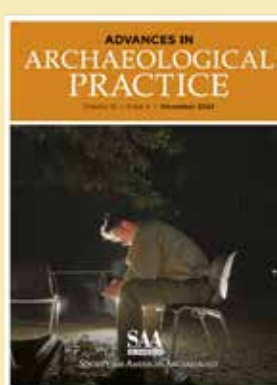
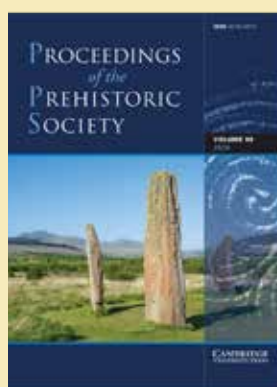
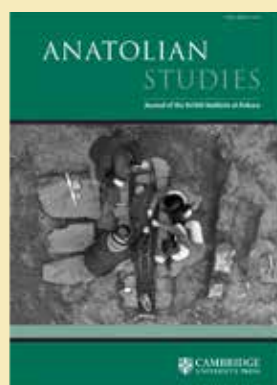
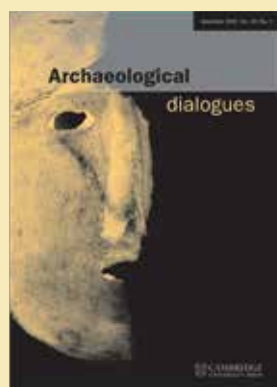
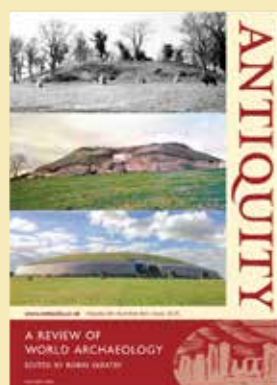
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Annual Meeting Themes

1. On artefacts and beyond

Material culture studies today rest on integrative ways of solving questions regarding objects made by human hands. Traditional and ever-current studies of style, shapes, colour, production process and decoration of vessels, tools, utensils, furniture, weapons, buildings, structures, architectural sculptures, etc. continue alongside investigations of consumption and consumerism, landscapes and communications, distribution, and trade/exchange. Here, the focus of the study includes a wider contextualization of artefacts, social class and identity, gender performativity, rituals, traditions, innovations, and more. By including methods from the natural sciences, the archaeological observation of artefacts has been deepened, especially in matters of technology and innovative procedures in the making of objects. The ways in which objects are made, and in which people use them, are crucial to understanding cultures and social communities in the past. This is why material culture is still the main source of information that provides archaeologists with a foundation in creating interpretations and conclusions about the past. We invite session proposals connected, but not limited, to:

- Artefacts in context: contextualization, interpretation, and re-interpretation
- Technology, operational sequence, and spatial organization of technological behaviour
- Artefacts in systems: typology, classification, and seriation
- Design, function and meaning of things
- The art of artefacts – decorative and applied arts, media, and material culture
- Material culture and cultural landscapes - mobile, rural, and urban
- Consumption patterns, distribution of products, trade/exchange, gifts of power
- Symbolic behaviour
- Mortuary practices
- Houses, housing, and households – structures and infrastructures
- Gendered artefacts
- Object biographies and itineraries

2. Intertwined Epistemologies: Transcending the Data – Theory Divide

The aim of archaeology is the comprehension of the co-creation of diverse forms of human lives and equally diverse cultural contexts. To this end, our field of research has been rooted in the twin domains of hard sciences and humanities, incorporating a plethora of theoretical approaches and perspectives. The periodic outbreak of theory wars has not brought us any closer to the conclusive answer as to which epistemic tradition is best suited for our particular purposes. Instead of striving for this answer, it may be more beneficial to look at our practices, that have always intertwined various strains of inquiry, and to embrace diversity/plurality/disunity/multi-scalar approaches when searching for epistemic improvements. This is especially the case at the moment of substantial advancements in the domain of data science, which necessitate critical reflection when transferred to archaeology. We invite session proposals connected, but not limited, to:

- From human-animal relations to multi-species pasts
- The Ontological Turn
- Politics and late capitalism imprinted in archaeology
- Evidential reasoning
- The end of the world/ the study of social collapse
- Digital humanities and data-driven archaeology
- The revival of grand narratives
- Human behaviour in pluralistic contexts
- Gender, queer and transgressive archaeology
- Social bonds and the viscosity of identity
- The memory and sedimentation of time

3. Exploring methods in research, education and communication

Methodology has two principal meanings: a corpus of systematically and logically ordered knowledge for appropriate research conduct; and a study of research methods themselves. Method, then, is one of the cornerstones of each discipline, its theory and practice, and the legitimization of its scientific achievements. In its endeavours to interpret past people, their life, works and ideas from material remains, archaeology has succeeded in building complex systems of methods which span the humanities, the social and natural sciences and technology. It is of crucial importance not only for expanding its archaeological methodological arsenal but also reflecting and integrating heterogeneous methodological knowledge in research and other domains of archaeological practice. Despite the great heterogeneity of topics as well as the presence of methodological topics in other theme blocks, the guiding idea is the exploration of the potential of archaeological methodologies from a variety of perspectives. We invite session proposals connected, but not limited, to:

- Advancing methods in studying materiality in archaeology from micro to macro-scales
- Data Science in archaeology and heritage sciences
- Patterns vs. contingencies in interpreting material culture
- Sampling strategies in the Big Data era
- Digital archaeology in research and communication
- Methods for recording, maintaining and using retrieving large data sets
- Learning archaeological methods and skills
- Potentials of Artificial intelligence in archaeological research, heritage protection, and communication
- Communicating through objects: perspectives of archaeological displays
- Readjusting and contextualising scientific methods in archaeological research
- Advances in field surveys, excavation, and field recording
- Thinking through ethnoarchaeology and experimental archaeology

4. De nobis fabula narratur: archaeological practice and a profession in flux

Constant reflection on, and research into, the practical workings of archaeology in its disciplinary and wider social contexts are crucial for reinforcing archaeology's status as a scientific discipline and contributor of expert knowledge for protecting heritage and communicating scientific and heritage values to the public. Archaeology acts within different domains, legislative frameworks and numerous other conditions which, to a great extent, define and affect not only the knowledge it produces but also the archaeologists themselves, their economic and social status, motivation, social engagement, the institutions where they are employed and ultimately, the conditions of the production of archaeological knowledge. We invite session proposals connected, but not limited, to:

- Academic and applied archaeology
- What and how archaeology is taught at universities after the Bologna reform?
- Social engagement, activism, and responsibility of archaeologists
- Critical reflection and history of archaeology
- Status and perception of the archaeological profession
- Social inequalities and precarity in archaeological practice
- Searching for balance between public and entrepreneurial archaeology
- Biographies and autobiographies of archaeologists
- Transnational mobility: experiences from work in foreign countries
- Ethics, mission, and professionalism in archaeological research, education, and communication
- Advances in co-design and participatory approaches for greater integration of archaeological practice with society and its needs

5. Finding the way! Archaeological sciences and opening new research perspectives

The participation of many diverse sciences and scientific disciplines has become woven into archaeological practice. The co-habitation of archaeology and science produces procedures that become a necessary and common practice in archaeology, but also guides us through new challenges, opens new avenues of exploration, and inspires future development in the study of past societies. We invite session proposals connected, but not limited, to:

- Sciences in archaeology to archaeological sciences
- Empowering bioarchaeology and geoarchaeology
- Revealing individual and collective histories through biomolecular and isotopic studies
- Layers of health, crisis, ageing, external influences, and life changes in organic tissues
- Connecting computer science and artificial intelligence
- Big and Open: research data and FAIR principles
- Looking from the air and beneath the ground: remote sensing and geophysics
- Archaeometry: measuring time, space, and matter
- Environmental archaeology of the Anthropocene

- Exploring water courses and fluvial landscapes
- Technological studies and provenience analyses

6. Intertwining archaeology, heritage, and museums

Heritage can be understood as a sphere of interactions - of intertwined pasts and presents, cultures and natures, professionals and publics, individuals and collectives, ideals and pragmatics, economic and artistic interests, and local and global priorities. It is inherently contested and in constant flux, ever (re)negotiated by diverse agents and forces. By understanding heritage as the process by which these intertwined interactions are constructed and navigated in the present, we want to open avenues that explore the cyclical, spiralling, intertwined and layered nature of heritage. We invite session proposals connected, but not limited, to:

- Archaeological heritage in a changing Europe and world
- Decolonising, queering and enabling heritage, archaeology and museums
- The cultural economics of museums, heritage, and archaeology: value, commercialisation, wellbeing, and public benefits
- Contested, disputed, unwanted, destroyed: conflict and heritage
- Education and cross-curricular learning in archaeology, heritage, and museums
- Heritage and museum data, data sharing, data management models, data (re)use and data analysis
- Archaeology, art, and heritage
- Transcending the Eurocentric heritage
- People at the centre and peripheries of heritage
- Archaeology, heritage, popular media, and populism
- Multilayered, multimedia, and intertwined narratives and storytelling in archaeology and heritage
- Legislation and policy, including heritage crime and illicit antiquities

7. Climate Change in the Past and Present

Archaeological heritage is being damaged or destroyed by the many impacts of climate change, leading to a huge loss of archaeological information. The practice of archaeology is transforming in response to this reality as well as its relationship to the heritage management sector, museums, education, and policies. Archaeology is well placed to enhance the socio-ecological resilience of societies and their adaptive capacity to climate change through the study of past pathways to adaptation and mitigation. It is pivotal to translate fundamental archaeological research into actionable science to inform decision-making in the academy and in the public, as well as monitor climate change in relation to archaeological heritage. We invite session proposals connected, but not limited, to:

- Resilience, adaptation, and mitigation of climate change in the past and present
- Archaeological lifeways through the sustainability perspective
- Communication of the archaeology of climate change in academia and the public
- Education and training in the archaeology of climate change
- Sustainable museums and collections in times of climate change
- Protection of the archaeological heritage in times of climate change: best practices,

policies, laws

- Fieldwork adaptation, mitigation strategies, curation, in situ and digital preservation
- Climate change action in inter-governmental panels, agencies, and associations
- Heritage tourism and carbon mitigation
- The Archaeology of Climate Change in the Anthropocene

8. Along and across the Danube!

The river Danube is the second longest European river, flowing through large areas of central and southeastern Europe, from the Black Forest to the Black Sea. The Danube was the border during the Roman Empire, and in later periods as well, up to present-day state borders. The Danube always had a great impact on human communities: it connects distant regions, provides resources, represents threats (e.g., floods), shapes the landscape and human interactions with the environment. Some of the most famous sites in southeastern Europe are located on the Danube shores, from the Palaeolithic up to early modern times. Potential themes include the exploration of the archaeology of the regions connected with the Danube River basin and its tributaries from different perspectives, the interpretation of material culture, culture contact, and culture change, subsistence strategies, exploitation of the environment and inter-disciplinary studies, with a special focus on interactions between human groups and the overall role of this area in European prehistory and history. We invite session proposals connected, but not limited, to:

- History of research ideas and practices in archaeology in southeastern Europe
- Recent research – field surveys, excavations (systematic or rescue), analyses of archaeological assemblages of artefacts and ecofacts
- Interpreting material culture, applying theoretical approaches, exploring the latest scientific results in this region
- Landscapes of the past and present
- The Danube and its hinterlands – interactions between cultures and peoples
- Centre and periphery, trade and exchange, population movements
- The Roman Limes and the Danube as a border
- Settlements, urban and trade centres from Roman to Early Modern times
- Ottoman archaeology and heritage in Balkan countries
- The Danube basin's role in cultural reception, transformation, and transmission in Europe

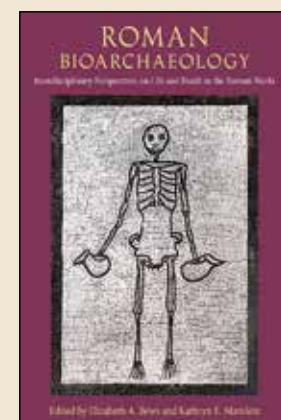
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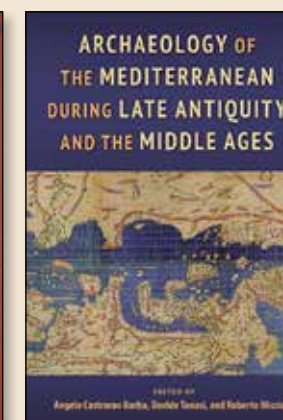
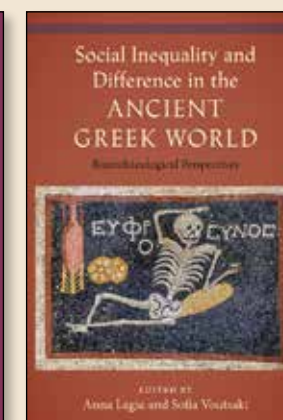
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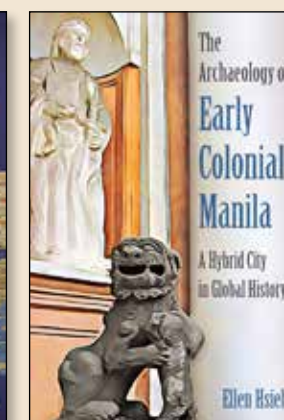
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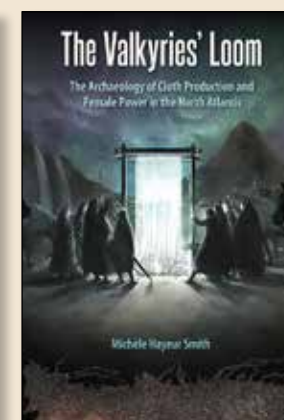
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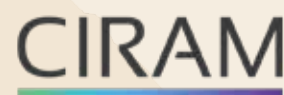
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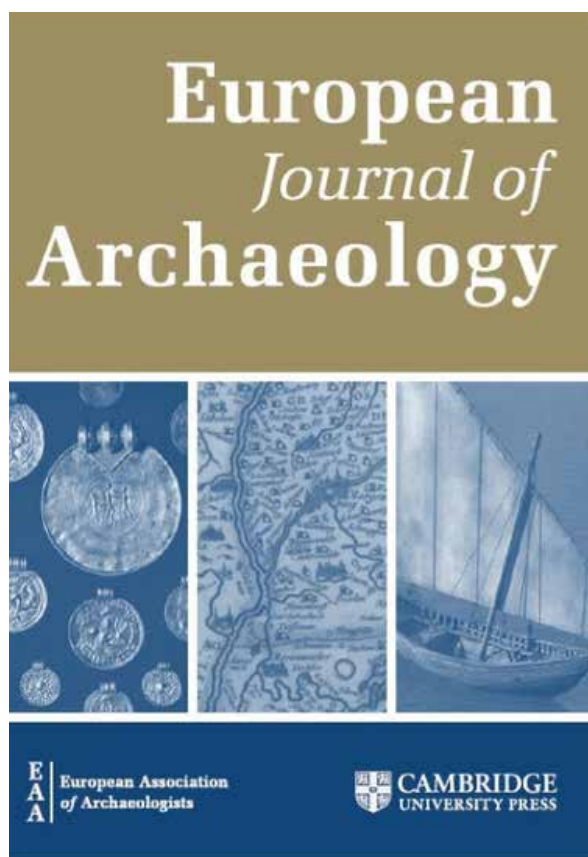


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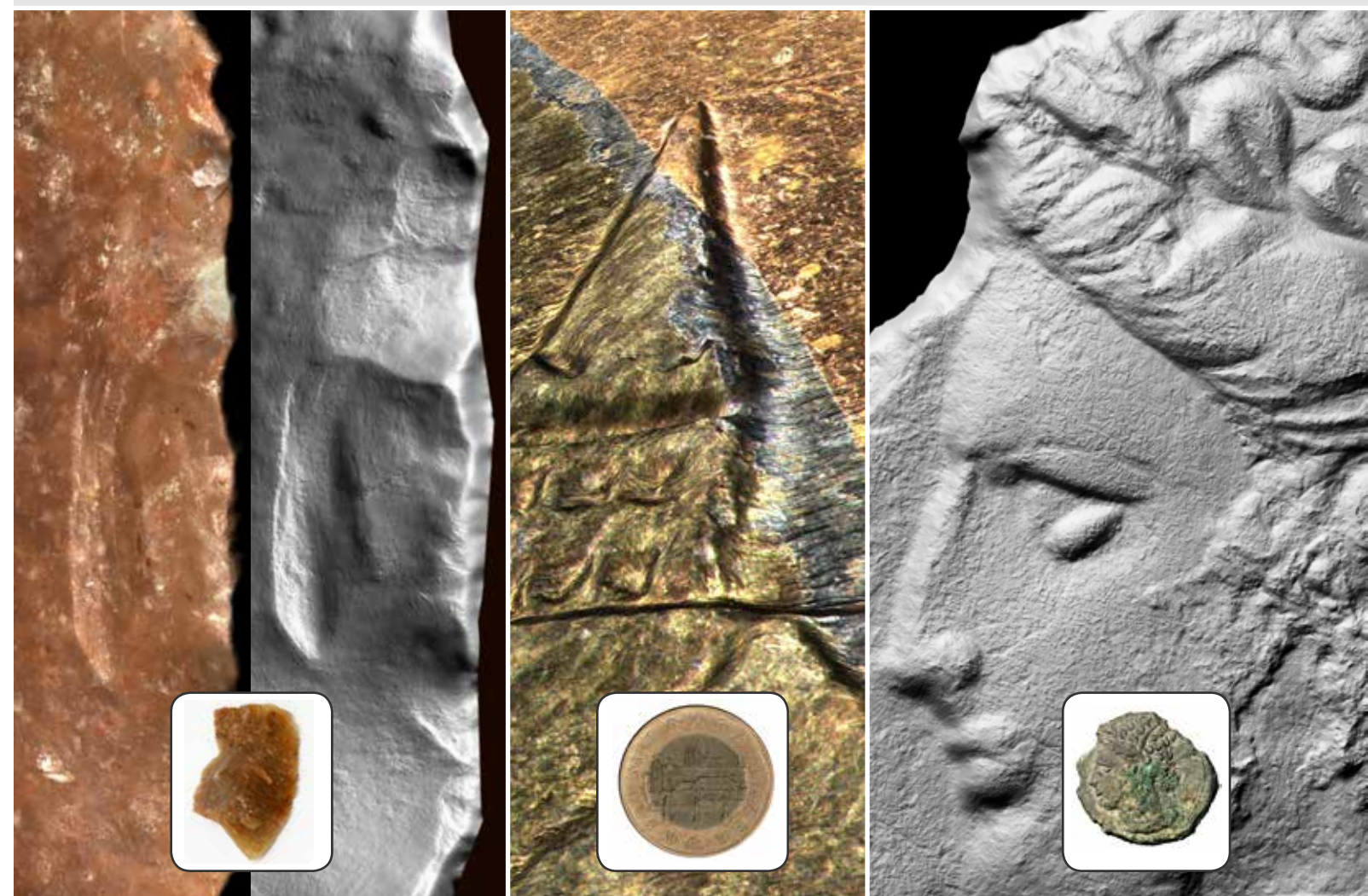
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How to Read the Scientific Programme

How the Conference is Organised:

The EAA 2025 Annual Meeting scientific programme runs over five days (Tuesday to Saturday), from 08:30 to 18:30 and 14:00 to 18:30 on Tuesday. Conference days are structured into four 2-hour blocks of parallel sessions, with scheduled breaks to support networking and informal exchange.

Daily Schedule:

08:30 – 10:30 | Parallel sessions (Block 1)
10:30 – 11:00 | Coffee break
11:00 – 13:00 | Parallel sessions (Block 2)
13:00 – 14:00 | Lunch break
14:00 – 16:00 | Parallel sessions (Block 3)
16:00 – 16:30 | Coffee break
16:30 – 18:30 | Parallel sessions (Block 4)

Sessions consist of 15-minute slots, which are used for oral presentations, introductions, or discussion.

Types of Contributions:

- Papers – 15-minute oral presentations given within specific sessions.
- Posters – Featured in digital format (as e-posters) and listed under specific sessions.

Presentation of Posters:

- There are no dedicated poster sessions, and posters are not officially presented by their authors.
- Instead, session organisers are asked to briefly introduce all posters at the start of their session.
- If time allows — such as when there are cancellations or free discussion slots — poster authors may give a short presentation, subject to agreement with the session organisers.
- All posters are available digitally through the conference mobile app and web platform.

How to Attend the Meeting Online

Virtual Format and Time Zone:

The 31st EAA Annual Meeting is held in a virtual format, which means all sessions, lectures and presentations are taking place remotely. The time zone for the whole conference is Central European Summer Time (CEST), which is UTC+2.

Conference Platform Integrated with Zoom:

The EAA 2025 programme will be accessible via a dedicated web platform and mobile app, both integrated with Zoom for direct access to all sessions and presentations.

Accessing the Platform:

The platform and app will become available about two weeks before the conference. All registered participants — those who have paid both the EAA 2025 membership and conference registration fees — will receive an email at that time with their login details and a link to access the web platform and mobile app.

How to Join a Session or Presentation:

Once you have logged in to the platform or app, go to the home screen and find the session or presentation you'd like to attend. When you click on it, you'll be taken directly to the Zoom room where it's taking place (more detailed instructions will be available on our conference website closer to the event).

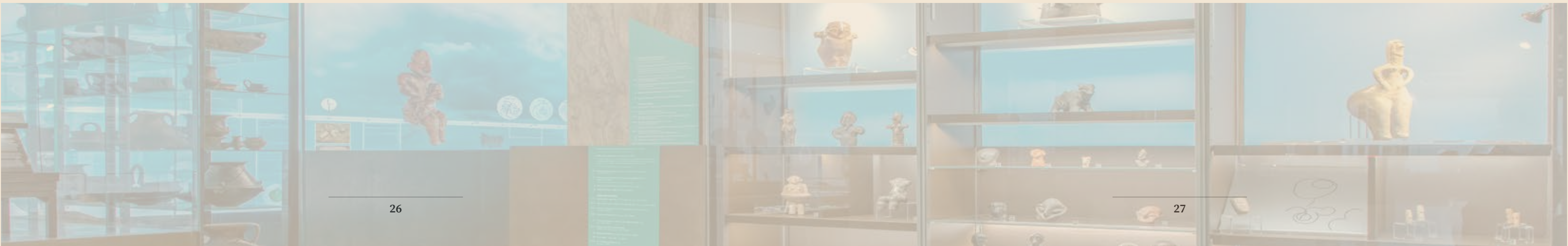
Please note sessions have a maximum capacity of 300 participants at a time. This does not apply to keynote lectures or the Opening and Closing Ceremonies.

How to Present an Oral Contribution:

Log in to the web platform (not the app), find your session link and join it – you'll be taken directly to the Zoom room where the session is taking place (detailed instructions will be posted on our conference website closer to the event).

Where to Find Posters:

Log in to the platform or app and tap the Abstracts & E-posters button. From there, you can browse all poster abstracts and view their attached e-poster files directly within the app.

To help you prepare, **virtual test rooms** will be available via the conference web platform starting one week before the conference. We encourage all participants, especially speakers and session organisers, to log in and test their setup in advance.

Speakers and presenters are also kindly asked to **pre-record their presentations** and send the videos to their **session organisers** as a backup, in case of any unexpected technical problems during the live session.

Onsite venue information:

The National Museum of Serbia, founded in 1844, represents the oldest museum institution in Serbia. The building of the National Museum of Serbia was constructed in 1903 for the purposes of the Funds Administration and later the Mortgage Bank, based on the award-winning project by architects Andra Stevanović and Nikola Nestorović. It is located at the Republic Square, one of the central town squares in Belgrade. In 1952, the building became the National Museum in Belgrade. The new permanent collection of the National Museum of Serbia represents a huge chronological period from the Paleolithic to the 20th century, from Lepenski Vir and Vinča, through the Medieval Period, and includes works of prominent artists such as Botticelli, Rembrandt, Cézanne, van Gogh, Toulouse Lautrec, Mondrian, and Picasso, as well as renowned Yugoslav and Serbian authors. With rich exhibitions and publishing activity, and the utilization of modern technologies, the National Museum of Serbia positioned itself as one of the prominent places for communication, as an open, dynamic, and accessible museum.

Closing Ceremony

Onsite venue information:

The Residence is one of the few surviving buildings from the time of Prince Miloš Obrenović’s first reign. It was constructed in 1830, based on the designs of Hadži Nikola Živković, the Prince’s official architect. Right after its construction, Princess Ljubica moved in with their two sons (later rulers of Serbia). Although originally intended to serve as the representative court of the Obrenović dynasty, it fulfilled this official function only during the reign of Prince Mihailo Obrenović, between 1839 and 1842.

After the fall of the Obrenović dynasty, the Residence was used for various purposes by different government institutions. In the 20th century, it was recognized as a significant site of historical, artistic, and memorial heritage, and was repurposed as a museum. Following its restoration and reconstruction, the Residence became part of the Belgrade City Museum in 1980, along with the permanent exhibition Interiors of 19th-Century Belgrade Houses. This exhibition features carefully selected objects of fine and applied arts that once belonged to the Obrenović dynasty and other prominent families. Together, they illustrate the origins and development of culture, everyday life, and domestic interiors in 19th-century Belgrade. Additionally, even the plants in the garden that surrounds the residency are old varieties of roses, representative of the 19th century.

On behalf of the Executive Board and the Prague staff, I extend a warm welcome to you all. As we present our Annual Report, it's a gentle reminder that another year has passed in the EAA timeline, from the huge and successful Rome Annual Meeting to our upcoming meeting in Belgrade.

Before you start reading our yearly report, please allow me some initial thoughts. As you will have all been informed, instead of travelling to Belgrade, enjoying the hospitality and the exhibition, learning from the excursions to world-famous archaeological sites - we need to go online this year. This call was made after careful consideration for the safety of our Members. It was an absolute necessity to make this decision. Despite the hard and intensive work of our Serbian colleagues and the Belgrade Scientific Committee, there has been no other responsible and prudent move – and the Executive Board finally agreed. While our venue, the University, has been closed since Christmas, the situation does not point toward de-escalation. Here I express my full sympathy to the Serbian students for their committed and enthusiastic energies for transparency and freedom – and my foremost gratitude goes to the local organisers, who have carried out devoted and intensive work for more than three years, to make our Annual Meeting happen. As a small sign of our thankfulness and support, the Executive Board and myself decided to travel to Belgrade and to stay there for the Board meeting and during the entire time of the conference. Archaeo-Sexism Exhibition

Description:
The Archaeo-Sexism exhibition consists of posters illustrating personal experiences of sexism, bullying and assault in archaeology. These testimonies were collected by the Paye ta Truelle Collective in 2017, and, in conjunction with the Archéo-Ethique Association, a selection of these were chosen to be illustrated to create a travelling exhibition. The aim of the exhibition is to raise awareness of gender-based and other forms of discrimination, in the hope of changing this situation and preventing these behaviours occurring in the world of archaeology and heritage.

Since its inauguration at the Maison des Sciences de l’Homme Mondes (formerly Maison de l’Archéologie et de l’Ethnologie) in Nanterre, on March 8, 2019, the Archaeo-Sexism exhibition has travelled across 11 countries (Germany, England, Austria, Belgium, Canada - province of Quebec, Spain, United States, France - including French Polynesia, Greece, Italy, Switzerland) and exists in 6 languages (French, German, English, Catalan, Spanish and Dutch). The exhibition on display here at EAA is the English language version, including panels translated from French in 2022 through funding provided by University College London, and testimonies from English-speaking contexts (UK, USA) specifically collected in 2020-2021 along with testimonies from #EveryDigSexism initiative.

Since EAA 2023, the EAA has supported a series of workshops (in Belfast 2023, Rome 2024 and online in 2025) addressing harassment, assault, intimidation and bullying (HABI) in archaeology, organised by Laura Coltofean, Bisserka Gaydarska, Marta Hlad and Kayt Hawkins, funded through the EAA community scheme and supported by Archaeology and Gender in Europe (AGE) community and the Education, Training and Professional Development Advisory Committee

Archaeology to help build better futures

Rachel J. Crellin

Abstract:
The last two decades of thinking in archaeological theory have been marked by the emergence of a wide range of relational theoretical approaches. Symmetrical archaeology, new materialism, assemblage theory, entanglement, posthumanism, the new animisms and Indigenous thinking have all pushed archaeological theory in new directions to reconsider the role of humans, our understandings of matter, the intransigence of dualisms and the political implications of our discipline. In a world marked by polycrisis, an engagement with archaeological theory offers one means through which to critically consider how we make our work relevant. In my own work I draw on posthumanist feminism as an affirmative relational framework through which I can not only better describe the diversity of pasts but also open up new ways of thinking that can contribute to the project of building better tomorrows. We have long known that whilst our discipline might study the past, it exists in the present and plays a role in shaping our futures. In this talk I will argue that archaeological theory offers a key way through which we can contribute to this collective process.

Biography:
Rachel is Associate Professor of Archaeology at the University of Leicester. She is the author of *Change and Archaeology* and a co-author of *Archaeological Theory in Dialogue* (with Craig Cipolla, Lindsay Montgomery, Oliver Harris, and Sophie Moore, 2021, Routledge) and *Archaeology for Today and Tomorrow* (with Craig Cipolla and Oliver Harris). Her research interests centre on archaeological theory, especially posthumanist feminism and new materialism, Neolithic and Bronze Age Britain and Ireland, and metalwork wear analysis. She currently co-directs the Round Mounds of the Isle of Man fieldwork project and leads the Leverhulme-funded project *A New History of Bronze*.

From an imagined past to an imagined future: a cross-section of archaeology, public archaeology, and heritage

Abstract:
Heritage-making, along with heritage policies and practices, is often perceived as a domain where binary opposites meet — pasts and presents, professionals and publics, individuals and communities, economic and scientific interests or governmental and civic society priorities.

Initially concerned primarily with archaeological heritage management — sites and objects, their stewardship, conservation, environmental monitoring and sustainability — archaeologists and heritage scholars gradually turned their attention to the processes of the construction of meaning of archaeological heritage. Concepts such as identity, memory, place, landscape, value, authenticity, representation, temporality or future(s) came into the focus. An important realm for critical archaeological heritage studies emerged through public archaeology, seen as a “place and practice” for critical reconsiderations of political, economic or legal contexts of making and preserving archaeological heritage.

Although critical heritage studies and public archaeology have already raised numerous questions challenging traditional approaches to heritage creation and entanglements (not interactions) within the heritage realm, there is still the need to ask some of the questions again.

1. What, in fact, constitutes archaeological heritage? Is archaeological heritage every archaeological deposit and each record? Why do archaeologists prefer to excavate heritage rather than archaeological sites? Archaeological heritage seems to be a “thing”. “Archaeological Heritage constitutes the basic record of past human activities” (EAA Rome 2024, topic 3).
2. Who or what may enter into the making of archaeological heritage? Are participation, inclusion, mediation or citizen science just buzzwords?
3. Do archaeologists and heritage professionals with archaeological background clearly recognize the necessity to change and to use their knowledge to grow from “gatekeepers” to community collaborators and activists, to contribute to societal transformation?

Biography:
Tatjana Cvjetićanin is a curator at the National Museum of Serbia (since 1990), at present of the Late Roman and Early Byzantine collection, as well as a full professor at the Department of Archaeology, Faculty of Philosophy of the University of Belgrade (since 2020). She holds Ph.D. in archaeology from the Belgrade University, Serbia (1997), and she is an alumna of the fellowship programme of the Alexander von Humboldt Foundation. She is the former director of the

National Museum in Belgrade (2003-2012).

Her interests are equally divided between topics related to archaeology in museums – public archaeology and museology and histories of those disciplines, with rich experience in museum management, strategic planning and development, and collection presentation and interpretation, and Roman pottery and phenomena related to the fortified Roman border. At present, she is the president of the Society for the Roman pottery studies, *Rei Cretaria Romanae Fautores*. She was involved in the development of the Balkan Museum Network, a regional NGO that recognizes museum professionals and museums as force for a change and important part of the peacebuilding effort at Balkan, and currently is the president of the Steering Board of the Network.

What does it mean to be Ethical as an Archaeologist in 2025?

Interrogating our relationship to Scientific Integrity, Activism, and Social Responsibility in uncertain times

Abstract:

As European Archaeologists we are currently living in an era of multiple challenges to our integrity as intellectuals and researchers. Our now entrenched neo-liberal economic structures and ideologies deeply impact the mechanics of everyday work in universities, museums, and contract archaeology (including austerity measures, privatization, and productivity measured by speed and quantity). At the same time, neo-conservative politics yet again prey on our pre-historic and historic pasts and the institutions devoted to these, to provide fodder for myth making and nationalist narratives. There is talk of “a crisis in the Humanities,” but paradoxically, the moment our critical thoughts start to have an impact on debates and policies, with regards to topics such as race, gender, colonialism, climate change, diversity and equality, they are attacked for being “woke” and “ideological.” The situation is exasperated by the undermining of scientific knowledge in public discourse, in particular online.

The past has always been political, but today the challenges are developing fast. These changes occur within the scientific realm, where new methods yield large quantities of new data (and new ways to analyse and process them), and outside of it, where a new political and cultural climate increases the stakes for how we work and the place we claim in cultural debates and scientific knowledge production. As archaeologists working with the silent materiality of the past, the labor of interpreting it has yet again become a profession with great responsibility to the present and the future. Archaeology as a discipline has the potential to be a vehicle to think through not only the complexity of human nature, culture, and experience, but also to visualize and critique systems of power, and perhaps even to offer alternatives. But to achieve this we must be critical, curious, and courageous. This keynote asks how we as archaeologists living and working in Europe, in 2025, can understand and address these challenges? More precisely,

- What does it mean to be a truly interdisciplinary archaeologist with integrity in an era characterized by the third science revolution and the neo-liberal university?

- What does it mean to be a specialist of the past in an era of nationalist and conservative myth making?
- What does it mean to be a socially conscious archaeologist devoted to meaningful engagement with communities in an era of “Elite Capture”? How can we do activism right?

Biography:

Liv Nilsson Stutz is a professor of archaeology at Linnaeus University in Sweden. She has a background in both archaeology and biological anthropology, and her work is focused on merging archaeological methods (archaeothanatology in particular) with archaeological and cultural theory to provide a framework to approach the human experience of death in the past. While the models she uses are general, most of her work has been in prehistoric archaeology. She is also committed to exploring and problematizing the professional ethics of the handling of human remains in museums and research. She is the director of the Linnaeus University Research Centre “Concurrences in Colonial and Postcolonial Studies” and currently serves on several editorial boards including the Yearbook of the American Association of Biological Anthropology and the Cambridge University Press series in World Archaeology.
